From the Rabbi's Study

WHY ALL THE SIMCHA?

The serious and introspective days of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur have passed. Our services were truly inspirational and meaningful. The final sounds of the Shofar marking the end of the Holy Season were sounded amid a full synagogue of adults and children, all making their voices heard on High.

No sooner had Yom Kippur passed than we prepared our little tabernacles in preparation of Succot, which comes only four days after Yom Kippur. This year, there was even a Shabbat in between. With very little time, we rushed to construct the booths and purchase the "Four Species"—*Lulav, Etrog, Hadassim and Aravot*.

Then we were ready for the "Season of Our Joy." Succot is the time of the Great Ingathering of the crops as we experience Hashem's bounty. We also recall our travels in the wilderness from Egypt to the Promised Land.

This long and beautiful holiday season concludes with Simchat Torah—a time of total joy and rejoicing. Why should this be? Because we have completed the annual cycle of the weekly Torah readings? That could be a time of sadness. It's all over. It's like saying, 'I'm glad that I'm through with you!'"

Of course, it's not like that at all.
